

Methods of Illusion: la Mise-en-scène from Drama to Fiction and Visual Arts

Description

Should art tell the truth or lie? Should art allow the audience to escape reality or to understand it better? Can a lie be truer than the truth? What is there behind an image, a character, a scenario, behind the many stories that millions of creative artists have imagined for us?

This interdisciplinary course explores the theme of ILLUSION and REALITY in different works of art to highlight its crucial importance not only in theatre, but also in fine arts, novels, opera and finally in cinema. ILLUSION is the very essence of the theatre as on stage everything appears 'as if' it is something else: a sort of deception that takes the audience back and forth in time, in distant locations real or imaginary. After a closer view, we discover that it is an essential element used to represent the world, to transform an ephemeral reality into a permanent and universal truth in any work of Art, not just on stage.

Each class is dedicated to a different masterpiece and will analyse different illusions in varied situations with their corresponding outcomes: comic, tragic and frightening. The key concepts that describe Illusions in art are: artifice, deception and seduction. The artifice tells us that every story is 'artificially' real, the deceptions reveal surprising and unexpected truths, and finally to rely on the illusion, to believe the deception, the audience needs to be 'seduced'. Illusions are present in many stories, described by powerful symbols and motifs such as masks and disguises, dopplegängers, dreams or nightmares, mirrors and other mysterious artifices to help us see beyond the eyes, within the illusions, in the deepest and remotest corners of our mind.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- Prepare an oral presentation or hand in, before the Final Exam, a 6-10 page paper on one text (drama, fiction, cinema) on a subject to be defined with the teacher. The assignment will focus on the themes discussed in class, namely artifice, deception/illusion and seduction.

Mid-term and Final Exams are written.

Handing in papers late without a satisfactory explanation will result in a diminished grade.

Prof. Laura Belloni received her degree in Languages and Foreign Literatures at UCSC in Milan, with a senior thesis on the English Opera, and a PhD in English Drama, with a dissertation on "The Ascent of F6 (1936) and the dramatic theatre of W. H. Auden". She attended courses in American Literature and Creative Writing at the University of East Anglia, in Norwich, UK. After working at Radio24, a national radio, and "Airone" a national magazine, she went into teaching and she is currently running courses in Comparative Literature and Literature & Drama at the UCSC Department of International Relations. She also teaches English at the faculty of Languages and Business English at the UCSC Department of Economy. Her current research areas focus on Drama, as well as Comparative Literature.
