




Ladies and gentlemen... The International Office!

Rome, the «Chaotic City»






Rome is also a vibrant and at times chaotic city, due to its massive size and the fact that it is made of many different areas, zones and neighborhoods, each with their own quirks.

For someone who is planning a long-term stay in Rome for the very first time, it can feel disjointed and confusing at first.

Rome has a circular structure, inside of which the many different zones ("Municipi") that make up its territory are positioned.


The city is surrounded by a ring-shaped toll-free motorway, called "Grande Raccordo Anulare".



- through an online app on your phone, such as "MooneyGo" or "TicketAppy".


Remember to buy and then validate your tickets! Public transportation officials are very strict on this.

Checking the ATAC Website

ATAC is the name of the service that is in charge of two of the most important means of public transport in Rome: the Metro and the Bus system.

If you are planning to move around the city and you need a reliable indication of whether certain transport services will be fully operational, checking https://www.atac.roma.it/ is definitely a good idea.





What to do in case of strikes?


Taxi Service

- White taxis are generally cheaper and easier to find in Rome than UBER.
- They generally accept cards, <u>but always ask the driver</u> <u>first.</u> Do not assume that they accept credit card payments without explicitly asking beforehand.

How to catch a cab:

- At a taxi stand at several points throughout the city.
- You can call a taxi by using the following phone numbers. Please clearly mention your current location when talking to the phone operators: 063570 or 060609










The Rome Campus of Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore






If you happen to have forgotten your password, access the login panel, then select the 'forgotten password' option.









Coffee Bars



You can take advantage of the coffee bars around the city or even on Campus, for a quick snack, a coffee, a «cornetto» or... cappuccino.











DON'T ORDER CAPPUCCINO AFTER 12 IN THE MORNING...

Food and Drink

- Payment system varies in bars and restaurants
- *Aperitivo*: it's a pre-dinner/relax after work moment that usually goes from 6.00 pm to 9.00 pm.

You can have drinks and snacks or small dishes.

 Tipping isn't expected (You may leave some extra euros and this will be appreciated, but it is not necessary).

However, you will be charged a '*coperto*' (service fee) that is usually around € 2,00 per person

■ Lunch time: 13.00 pm – 2.30 pm Dinner time: 7.00 pm – 10.00 pm

- Public water fountains: free, clean water
- Visit the local farmers market for an authentic Italian grocery shopping experience
- Typical breakfast at the bar: cappuccino and cornetto (also called brioche or croissant)





Safety Tips

- When going out at night in clubs and bars:
 - Be aware of cultural differences with regards to drinking
 - Use the coat check or cloakroom
 - Always make sure to watch out your own glass
 - Always walk away from provocations
 - Ask for help from professionals
 - Go into a public shop or a bar, if you feel threatened in any form.

Safety Tips

When you feel you are in a potentially risky situation, always try to blend. Thieves and pickpockets tend to target tourists.

- Be aware of pickpocketing. It is a frequent risk especially around the main train/metro stations (for instance Termini, Ostiense, Trastevere, Gemelli)
- In general, it is not a good idea to be out alone at night.
- Take precautions for your safety while travelling
 back home after a night out.
- Use a taxi to get back home, if needed.
- Always try to travel in groups, so as to minimize unneeded risks.

- Always make sure your backpack/handbag is closed. Hold
 your bag/backpack in your arms on transport
- Don't leave your phone/wallet on the table in bars
- In Italy you are required to always have an **ID card** with you.

 However, we advise you to keep your **passport** in your **apartment** in a **safe place**.
- Make sure you have scans or copies of your important
 documents, and keep them safe at home/ online



Rules and Expectations

- Appropriate clothing is expected at University: watch and learn from local students!
- Be aware of your surroundings.
- Quiet hours are generally 10 pm on weekdays and 11 pm on weekends.
- If you visit a church, cover shoulders and knees and remove hats.
- Get out of your comfort zone!
- Interact with locals.






Interacting with other people


This is definitely not appropriate...

- Always use proper grammar.
- Refrain from making use of an excessive and/or inappropriate amount of modern slang.
- The purpose and intent behind all your e-mails should always be to clearly convey your request and allow others to easily understand you.






The right communication style is key



When you send a request to either a Professor or a University representative/office and you experience some unexpected delay, it is easy to get carried away and start sending the same e-mail multiple times repeatedly, over and over and over...



Try to avoid that: they definitely got your message the first time! Sending the same thing multiple times will not help them get back to you in a quicker fashion!


Never expect or demand to receive an answer to any of your e-mails within 24-48 hours. If it happens, that's great! But remember that it is not necessarily a cultural norm here.



The right communication style is key

Using the right linguistic style and adapting your style accordingly, based on the authority and the level of the person you are talking to, is an essential skill to learn. It is a way to demonstrate **respect** and mutual **understanding**.

- When you have to send an e-mail, use the proper style depending on the tone and confidential level of the person you are talking to.
- It is better to use somewhat formal greetings if you had no prior interaction with someone, or if you are talking to a Professor ("good morning Professor", instead of just "Hi", "Hello", etc.)
- Always sign your e-mails with:
 - Your Name and Surname
 - The Course that you are attending and the Year
