Description

In this course we look at international economic interaction from two perspectives, that of a nation (government) and that of a firm. The purpose is to understand important drivers of and challenges to economic globalization both at the level of nation states and at the level of individual businesses.

Course contents

- (i) International trade, foreign investments, and migration.
- (ii) The firm abroad: outsourcing and multinational corporations

Prerequisites

The teaching of this course relies to a high degree on models and abstract concepts and it is strongly recommended that you are confident with formal reasoning at a level taught in undergraduate economics courses.

Method of instruction

Lectures and group presentations.

Course requirements

Students (organized in groups) are asked to hand in bi-weekly exercises as well as a term-paper.
